We zoomed open this evening with an announcement from Keith White (our guy who has a hand in every Chapter pie) that Mike Stewart is looking for someone to manage Smith Garden. Tom Gressler, our current caretaker for Smith, is having health problems which makes taking care of the Garden more Someone amidst the various onscreen viewers suggested Tom adopt a couple of high school boys with muscles. There are many rhodies in bloom now even though we've had some very nasty weather this past winter and spring. Anne Gross commented that Smith Garden is in a sort of microclimate that allows the rhodies to bloom earlier than elsewhere, and the bloom is just in time for the up-coming Convention. Anne also said more volunteers are needed to "man" the Garden during the tour times

We then hopped right into our evening's talk, by Steve McCormick and John Stevens on the Rhododendrons of Southern Chile. Both gentlemen are very active in the ARS. John is the current ARS Western Regional VP and Steve is the President and the Newsletter Editor of the Portland ARS Chapter. Both also have degrees in fields other than flowers. One studied business and the other studied music. But when they retired, they knew they wanted to garden. They didn't start out just gardening in the backyard of a house in a city somewhere. Instead, they scouted for property and ended up purchasing land on the Washington beach "branch" called Long Island. It turned out to be an excellent buy. The 5 acres they bought were that of Harold Clarke, the third President of the ARS. Over the years they've had the property, Steve and John have been able to integrate the existing plants (including rhodies, of course) with other plants collected from Victoria BC to Eureka, CA

Steve and John have always been interested in South America and what rhodies, if any, could grow there. Their research led them to Southern Chile which has a climate similar to ours. So in November 2015 they flew to Puerto Varas to see what they could see. The climate did feel like home but the architecture was very different. The Germans who originally came over from Europe built their houses in a style that is very recognizable. Since it was Spring in Chile, the rhodies were in full bloom and well displayed. They also found that the farther south they went, the more German was spoken.

They also found rhody "relatives" there; Ericaceae and about 396 species of Asteraceas. Although the length of Chile is about the same as the width of the USA, the rainfall amount is almost the same. Chile also has a variety of climates like we do: desert, mountains (Andes), ocean coast and, unlike us, fjords or glaciers. The rhododendrons and azaleas (sorry Herb) are treasured there.

When the European explorers came to South America, they brought with them botonists - types as well, to check out the local greenery. One of those was Charles Darwin. He was a friend of James Hooker as well as of Marianne North, who did superb paintings of the rhodies they saw there. By the late 1800s the Germans were moving to Chile "by the dozens". They also brought with them a desire to learn more about their new country and started collections of species. They developed estate gardens and started hybridizing their floral finds. Some of the major parks/estates developed were Pumalin Park in Puerto Varas and Virero e Manzane nursery.

The guys found that, in nurseries, rhododendrons were named by their color and not by the name given them when they were registered. However, once the plant is purchased for resale, the registered name is used again. Most of the nurseries in Chile are in the Lake Region. And I must add here before I forget, John and Steve had beautiful photographs to

go with their talk.

They also visited Argentina and Venezuela which I hope will be another talk. We thank Steve and John for a most interesting viewpoint of Chile and our favorite flower.

Left at next stop sign (71st St.)
Take next right (Jordan St)
Turn left on 75th Ave
Right on Pudding Creek Drive

From Cordon Road:

East on Macleay Rd Turn right on 74th Turn left on Pudding Creek Drive

The house is towards the middle of the block and set back from the road by a long gated driveway which is across the street from the mailbox. The gate will be left open and a flag will mark the entrance. Google maps and other GPS guidance will work for their address.

Road Trip!

On Saturday April 23rd our chapter had our second face-to-face event since early 2020. The first was the truss show April 15th and 16th at Bush Park, with the plant show of The Friends of Bush Park. This went smashingly well. We gained four new members. On the next Saturday we did our road trip to Eugene.

We met in front of Wally and Kathy Reed's house in the south Bush Park parking area. From there we travelled to the Gossler Farm Nursery in Springfield. Present were new members Chas Schmid and Emily Braithwaite, both research botanists at Oregon State University. Also Becky Delury, recently moved to a property in Salem on Mill Creek, Bill Vagt, Anne Gross, Paul and Susan Doellenger and two of their friends, Mary Crofts, and Mary Ellen and I. The weather was clear and sun-Roger Gossler, who with brother Eric, manages the Nursery was a great informative and friendly tour guide. He led our group on a historical - botanical journey through the property. The Gossler family established the farm in the 1960's. There were many grand old specimens. From the early days it was onward and upward. Magnolias and Rhododendrons were blooming, but these were but a small part. Gossler's is famous for growing the best of the usual and the best of the rare and unusual in many genera. After the tour we enjoyed walking through the numerous hoop houses, salivating over the great variety of wonderful plants, some of which rode home with us.









By this time, we were all getting hungry. We travelled the hills and dales south to Rocky Knoll Farm at Little Fall Creek, the farm and garden of Jack Olson. Jack provided us the exceptional setting to have lunch on his patio surrounded by his beautiful garden and pond. Jack was a great host. He gave us the history of his place and alluded to his many skills—First as a teacher, then a summer menial worker to earn money to buy his dream property, working his way up to be a certified pipefitter! Jack taught us about hybridizing and about the great hybridizers he knew at his end of the Willamette Valley. He is carrying on with the hybrids that they created, as well as his own. He took us around the huge periphery of his garden where he has his up and coming species and hybrids He showed us the many species of exotic Podophyllums (commonly called "May Apples") and araseamas (look it up in Wikipedia) that he is growing from seed. Jack showed us the restored classic cars he has. We ended up staying longer than we had budgeted because of Jack's fascinating, educational journey that he gave us.

Last was Hendricks ParK in Eugene. Here is the Eugene equivalent of Crystal Springs in Portland. This 12 acre rhododendron garden, established in the 1950's, is beautifully landscaped and maintained. Clearly such a very popular place that one had to be very innovative in order to park a car. Here there were many mature specimens that would give one the full range of the life of an elepidote rhododendron. We strolled around marveling at the big floriferous rhodys and the companion plantings of iris, daffodil, lepidote rhodies, lawns and ornamental trees. I think most of us were too burned out by the preceding visits to Gossler's and Jack Olson to take full advantage of the opportunity.







From here we split up going our separate ways towards home. Mary Ellen, Mary Crofts and I refreshed ourselves with a hardy early dinner at the very nice and capacious Hop Valley Pub and Brewery that is next to I-5, just north of Springfield. For me, a hop garden worthy of a long stop.
