In spring when maple buds are red, We turn the clock an hour ahead; Which means, each April that arrives.


We lose an hour out of our lives.

February Minutes February 14, 2024

We met at 5 pm at La Margarita in Salem for our supper and a lot of great visiting. There were plenty of both with room enough for eating a chocolate truffle (or two or three) brought in a basket by Mary Ellen Ramseyer. We also spent some time checking out the various plants brought by Bill Vagt and Anne Gross to auction off or to raffle away. Both brought plants that bloom this time of the year and at the same time, are not the usual suspects. This fall it was apparent that we did not have a system for assuring our members were wearing name tags. So we took a lesson from the Portland chapter. Susan Doellinger, our Greeter, is now in charge of our name tags. Susan will hand out the name tags to members as they arrive and collect the name tags as members leave. That way they will not get forgotten at home or in the glove box.

President Dana Malby called the meeting to order with Treasurer Adele O'Neal being first. All was good with the financial report. We discussed the possibility of being a part of the annual Yard,Garden and Home Show held in March. A sign-up sheet for those who would be able to "man" the booth was passed around. Later we will email an interactive sign up sheet. (ed. Keith says that these little stints are fun.) Dana is making up a list of possible nurseries where we could purchase plants that we could later sell at the Show. Someone suggested we make up flyers with the rhododendrons we have for sale as well as our web site. It was also suggested we make a video of rhodie pics to run like a loop at our booth.

The Hillside Garden needs a Spring cleanup. Brian Smith, horticulturist for City of Salem and in charge of garden volunteers, will meet with Dana and Keith on March 13th to walk through the garden and discuss projects to be done by our group.

The wording for tags to go in plants is complete. They will be 1"X 6" plastic spikes that say, "The Willamette Chapter of the American Rhododendron Society recommends this nursery. Please join us for fun, food, flowers, facts and fellowship. Programs and events throughout the year. website: <u>arswillamette.</u> <u>com</u>"

In April and May the Cecil and Molly Smith Garden will be open for weekend visits by the outside world. The Portland Chapter has 3 big events in April and May to staff with volunteers from their chapter. Those being, the Van Veen Heritage Garden booth at Hortlandia, on Sat/Sun April 6th and 7th, their Early Show on April 13th and their May 11th and 12th Mother's Day Show. So, it is critical for our members to sign up to be garden hosts on those three weekends. Also remember that members of the Portland Chapter volunteer on Crystal Springs Garden and Van Veen Nursery work days. So, it is up to our members to understand this and pitch in heartily to host the Smith Garden. A sign-up list will be presented.

Before Keith's talk, plants were auctioned and/or raffled. The tiny narcissus went to Karen Landers for \$20 and Keith got the cream deciduous hellebore for \$25...money well spent, since the money from auctioned plants is needed for our near "bare cupboard" treasury. The raffled plants went to Paul Doellinger, Adele O'Neal and Anne Gross.

Time for Keith White's talk. Let's shorten this... If you've had the pleasure of being one of his patients or also one of his rhody-friends, then he needs no real introduction except to say you've truly met a man who knows a lot about rhododendrons....He's been a rhody fan since medical school days' frequently visiting Crystal Springs and when returning from Alaska, he was mentored in "rhodothink" by some of the "greats" of the rhododendron world. He's been on several botanical expeditions to China and Tibet as well as Sikkim. All have been led by notables such as Britt Smith, Ken and Peter Cox or Steve Hootman of the RSBG (he's on their board of directors and heads their photography committee). He's an excellent photographer and a really good speaker, so it's hard to write about something that's so beautiful to listen to and watch. It's really a case of "you just gotta be there". Keith had been to Sikkim in 1992 with a group lead by Britt Smith and in a 2015 (23 years later) expedition led by Steve Hootman, Curator and Director of the RSBG. Both of the Sikkim expeditions covered most of the same ground with some of the same Sikkimese staff who were present in 1992. Although all expeditions centered on genus Rhododendron, there was botanizing directed on many other genera at a wide range of altitudes.

Keith's photos showed both the "same" and "different", especially in the monasteries. Of course, the rhodys stole the show...they were blooming as if each day was a special day for them. The explorers spent many hours going up and down "roads" or "trails" made by man and beast over many, many years until the dirt would have been more like rock. Some were roads or trails that looked like a road or a trail...wide, sort of solid. Others were trails that literally clung on the side of a steep cliff. No railings either. They found 36 species of rhodies in the three treks through rhody rich areas of Sikkim. (amongst the species observed were R arboreum, fulgens, dalhousii barbatum, hodgsonii, campanulatum, campylocarpum, thomsonii, nivale, niveum – the royal flower of Sikkim, anthopogon, glaucophyllum, triflorum lepidotum, setosum, etc., and on the plethora of other genera). There was a lot about Sikkimese history, religion, lifestyle, and food. Some plants were tiny-wee and some were huge trees. Some were surviving with nothing but a dead "parent" tree...a younger rhody but the same species as the one they were growing on and that one was dead. And other of his photos showed the vast beauty of the land, especially my favorite showing a row of white mountains behind a dense fog bank and that was behind a row of blooming rhodies.

When Keith had finished his talk (no idea what time it was and anyway, who cared what time it was), Susan got all our badges and we drifted away into the rain.

Your Help is Greatly Needed Opportunities to Volunteer!!



The Smith Garden Open Garden Days This takes place on Saturdays and Sundays during the months of April and May. Today, the 21st of January I could hardly wait for the ice and snow to disappear so could head out to take look at the Rhododendron Park in Eugene. I wanted to see what was blooming and how badly snow and ice had damaged plants in the park. There were some downed trees and branches, but it was not as bad as what the park had experienced during past winters.

Hendricks Park sits on top of a hill in South Eugene, with the lovely residential homes surrounding it. From the park you can see great views of Eugene, especially the university area.

The park is very enjoyable: it has places to meander, and to admire very old trees, especially rhododendrons. At the same time, you can sit, relax and listen to the sounds of nature.

Hendricks Park has many sections. For example: the alpine garden is interesting with all sorts of evergreen trees and shrubs including rocks placed as points of interest. In the gardens are many paths for meandering, and admiring things from different angles as you pass.

I should mention that one beautiful specimen that I noticed (that always blooms at this time year) was a variety of witch hazel. It was so beautiful with colorful, fragrant fuzzy flowers. Witch hazel is one of the surprising high lights of the winter garden. I will include pictures. You can judge the beauty but unfortunately not the fragrance, for yourself.

One new addition placed amongst the rhododendrons is a memorial for our friend, Harold Greer, who was the author of several rhododendron books, hybridizer, nurseryman and officer of the ARS, gold medal recipient and organizer of many ARS meetings. He is missed by us all.

When near Eugene, make a point to visit Hendricks Park.

My message, if I may, to all you plant lovers, is to visit your gardens of interest in all seasons. You will see so many more and new forms and colors and surprising plants and views that you had not expected. This will make you appreciate your favorite gardens even more.

Predominant Flower Color: Pink

Flower/Truss Description: Flowers with nectar pouches are bell-shaped to 1 3/4". Campanulate, pink to white tinged pink, with purple spotting. Truss holds 5-10 flowers

Fragrant: No

Bloom Time: Early to Early Midseason

Foliage Description: Medium sized leaves are oblanceolate, with smooth tops, stalkless glands on the reverse, rounded apex, retained 2-3 years. Peeling bark.

Plant Habit: Upright shrub or small tree

Height: 6 feet in 10 years.

Cold Hardiness Temp: 0°F (-18°C)

Elepidote (E) or Lepidote (L): E

Sub Genus: Hymenanthes

Section: Ponticum

Sub Section: Thomsonia

Geographical Origin: China (S Tibet)
