DVD Program Review

Frank Fujioka

Program for Societe Bretonne du Rhododendron

Last night I watched a super good show that Frank Fujioka gave to the French Rhododendron Society in 2006. The photography is excellent. There is no narration...Instead there is beautiful, upbeat symphonic music. Every plant is labelled. Segments are introduced in French script. However, the subject of the following is so obvious that you are bound to learn some new French words. First there is an overview of Frank's garden (located on Whidby Island with a fantastic view of Hood's Canal). Then a cavalcade of Frank's many successful hybrids, including good views of the plant out of bloom highlighting the perfect foliage that Frank is famous for. Then a series documenting the hybridizing process, from pollination to seeds to sewing, transplanting et al, to the development of a cross over the years, including the rows of crosses in his growing area arranged by years in which the cross was made. Then pictures of a number of desirable traits followed by pictures of undesirable traits a cross may have and photos of Frank's waste pile where reject specimens are piled unceremoniously. The next segment shows the results of several crosses that are beautiful but he had not yet named or released. The whole program is peppered with fun fake photos including the last segment which shows rhododendrons superimposed on fanciful situations such as penguins admiring rhodies in antarctica, rhodies in the desert with camels, etc.

Our WCARS library has just acquired a set of 8 DVD's from the ARS collection. I will get this one or any of the others to you at your request. I am not sure if I will burn you a new disc, send the file over the net or put it in the cloud, or YouTube or what. We are still exploring possibilities.
