

October Meeting Minutes October 15, 2025

Greetings all! And Happy Fall! The lovely cool weather and moist soils have allowed the gardener in me to get back out and dig. Have fun planting bulbs and of course, rhodies!

Our October meeting was held at our usual place, La Margarita in Salem, and we were greeted by Susan Doellinger passing out nametags and numbers for drawings. As we settled and ordered our food, Dana passed out copies of the proposed budget, to peruse while we ate.

The meeting began with auctioning of rhodies that Thuy Chrestenson brought. Four beautiful rhodies selected by Thuy herself. Lucky for those that got one. We may have a chance to purchase more in the future. Thank you also to Ali and Keith who brought in plants for give away.

Program chair, Ali Sarlak, then introduced the speaker of the evening, Dr. Linda Hardison of OregonFlora Project. The project was initiated by Scott Sundberg in 1994, seeing a need for a comprehensive flora of Oregon. He worked on this until his death in 2004 when it was taken over by Dr. Hardison. The project is based at OSU utilizing its huge herbarium. Native plant species are described and documented based on location as well as taxonomically. The Flora deals with vascular plants only (no algae, mosses, lichen, or fungi). Over 4800 plants have been described with an ever increasing list.

Some interesting facts about the plants in the flora-

- · 170 families
- · 1096 genera
- · 12,000 scientific names
- · 11 % of the flora in the state belongs to Asteraceae

The goal of three published books is nearly complete after 25 years of work. The exhaustive volumes are divided into chapters for ease of use. Illustrations are beautiful. Volume one and two are available through OSU. It is used by professionals as well as local gardeners to identify, classify and use plants throughout Oregon. In addition to the impressive books, Dr. Hardison guided us through the website Oregonflora.org Spending some time using the tutorials is time well spent. Dr. Hardison and her group have tried to make this vast information more accessible. Plants can be identified not only taxonomically but by geography, where the plant was found. Using the tutorials, is a fun and interesting adventure. Thank you Dr. Hardison. Since funding is quite dubious now, donations for the project are gladly accepted.

President Dana Malby then moved into the regular meeting, thanking our speaker and asking Treasurer Adele O'Neal for her report. Adele reported that we have \$4582.49 in checking and \$2419.94 in the Business Membership Account with donations from the Tallan's estate at almost \$700.

The proposed budget was discussed with the group. Bill Vagt motioned to accept the budget, seconded by Mary Ellen Ramseyer. Passed unanimously.

Dana thanked Carol McCarthy for her hard work as newsletter editor. We need a new newsletter editor – anyone interested? Mary Ellen has stepped in to be interim editor until someone else is found. Thank you Mary Ellen.

November Program



Speaker: *Mike Bones* Topic: *Rhodies* 101

November 12, 2025 Dinner: 5:00pm Meeting and Program when dinner is finished (apprx 6pm) La Margarita Restaurant and Grill

At the distribution time of this newsletter, I have no information on the topic of Mike's program, other than a title, so I will leave that to your imagination. I do have, however, some tidbits of information about Mike that came from the the Florence Chamber of Commerce and a newspaper publication, The W World.

Mike Bones started out in the gardening business when he was a teen-ager. He earned his spending money by pulling weeds and keeping people's yards trim and neat. Then, Bones met Agnes McCornack and rhododendrons. McCornack was a woman familiar to just about every longtime gardener who made it a habit of visiting Florence-area nurseries. While Bones' mom was into plants, it was McCornack who introduced Bones to what has become his life's passion.

"My pay was half in rhododendrons and half in money. I got 50 cents an hour," said Bones. He wasn't making a lot of money in those days, but he was amassing quite a collection of rhododendrons. Over the years, Bones cultivated so many of the shrubs he had to start a nursery (1978), in addition to keeping his full-time job as a ranger with the Oregon Parks and Recreation Division. Mike retired from his State job in 1999 to devote full time to his nursery business.

In 2023, the Florence Area Chamber of Commerce selected Mike as the grand marshal for their annual floral parade.

"Mike Bones personifies this year's 'Rip Roarin' Rhodies' theme, said Bettina Hannigan, Florence Chamber president and CEO. He is tremendously gregarious with an infectious spirit, a lot of fun, and is known to many in these parts for his longtime interest and expertise with our famous flowers. He's also a lot like our logo for this year--bright, colorful, beautiful, and he really pops."

The chapter puts on the second largest rhododendron show in the world behind only Chelsea, England.

Bones has won international recognition for his interest in rhododendrons by being awarded the ARS Silver Medal for his accomplishments in educating others about the flowers, and for his years of dedication and service to the Siuslaw and American Rhododendron Societies.

"During Covid, when the Florence Area Chamber of Commerce was unable to host the Rhododendron Festival, Mike walked the parade route both years, pulling a wagon full of rhododendrons while waving to those passing by. He single-handedly kept the event alive through all that adversity."

The following is quoted from the Rhododendron Species 2025, The Journal of the Rhododendron Botanical Species Garden:

"It had been a bumpy ride as I began to write this journal at the Kagoshima airport in Kyushu, Japan. As I sat there at the airport, I wondered if I could make it to my final destination, Yakushima, that same day."

"Yakushima (or Yaku Island) is located in southern Japan and home to the queen of *Rhododendron* species (in my opinion), *Rhododendron degronianum* subsp. *yakushimanum* (syn. *Rhododendron yakushiamanum*.) Just in time for my very first anticipated visit to this sacred island in late May, a tropical system had been upgraded to become the first typhoon of the 2024 season. This had caused mny flight cancellations in southern Japan."

The transition of R. degronianum with elevation gain from v. intermedium to ssp. yakushimanum was clearly seen. Gone but Not Forgotten



Wilbur Leroy Bluhm January 29, 1927 - October 25, 2025

Wilbur was a great asset to our chapter. He gave us several programs on the native flora of Oregon and twice, great programs on trees. Wilbur was a great photographer; thus his programs were very well illustrated. Wilbur hiked the remote wilderness areas and the not so remote but uncluttered populated areas to document the notable plants and wildflowers growing there. Wilbur contributed greatly to the Oregon Flora Project, the subject of our last program by Director Linda Hardison.

Every Memorial Day weekend, for several years, Wilbur lead our chapter, with the Hardy Plant Society, through the Siskiyou Mountains, Kalmiopsis Wilderness, and beaches in SW Oregon and N California in search of remarkable native plants.

My first exposure to Wilbur was as a back to back property owner with my grandparents. Wilbur was then the Marion County Agricultural Agent. My grandparents grew a big garden. They raved about the great advice Wilbur gave them. At the time, I was six years old.

I would love to have access to the many programs Wilbur did for us. If only.....

Re Gordon Wylie: A remembrance

Gordon Passed away last week at the grand old age of 93.

Gordon and wife Linda have been associate members of WCARS for many years. I first met Gordon during the 1985 ARS annual meeting in Eugene. Gordon was chairman of that conference and a more jolly, articulate and Humorous director could not be imagined. I was impressed by Gordon then and impressed by their beautiful garden. Later, when giving a program to our chapter about their garden, Gorden stated that when they bought the property in Eugene there was nothing on the lot except solid blackberry vines and some large pieces of junk that needed to be hauled away. Gordon and I spoke and joked at every meeting we were at together. Despite his good humor, Gordon was a very serious player in the management of the ARS, being in many committees and involved in the seed exchange. He was president of the ARS and awarded a Gold Medal in 2004 for all his contributions.

Gordon and Linda and I went with the Scottish Rhododendron Society to Belgium in 2010. We visited several arboretums with almost 200-year-old trees. For these arboreta, the "companion plants" were often rhododendrons. In one place the restrooms were half a mile away. Too far. Gordon and I found each other improvising "the facilities" behind a particular tree. That was a good laugh.

Several years ago, I and Bob Grasing were visited by Keith Rushforth, famous English plant explorer and tree expert. Keith was here to explore the Kalmiopsis and Siskiyou Mts. While I was in the operating room a few days earlier, the anesthesiologist, who had grown up in Reedsport, mentioned a hidden old garden across from the Elk Reserve, along the Umpqua River. On our way to the SW OR coast we stopped by the spot. It was clear to Keith that this was an overgrown, but special garden with exotic trees and many early rhododendron hybrids. Later I mentioned this to Gordon. Soon after that he and John Hammond from England explored the garden, and found that it had been created by timber tycoon Howard Hinsdale. The two of them made a deal with the BLM to rehabilitate and publicize the Hinsdale Garden, now open to the public on several special days of the year. John Hammond did extensive research and published a few articles on the garden history in the Journal ARS. **This garden is Gordon's gift to the people of Oregon.**
